CREATIVE BRIEF

1. What must it be?

A 1 to 3-minute montage

2. Who is it for?

Any audience that takes an interest in others' passions.

3. How long must it be?

1-3 minutes

4. What is your objective with the piece?

My objective is to have my subject share her passion for music and what it means to her, and to film the project using beautiful scenery and musical elements for my backdrop.

5. When is it due?

Sunday, August 4th

6. What is the overall idea?

A casual interview with a California local who enjoys music and making it.

7. What is the storyline summary?

Our subject talks about her passion while we observe her in her native surroundings – her backyard, possibly the beach, and at the piano, of course.

8. Elevator pitch:

A SoCal native shares her passion, the inspiration behind it, and the places that spark her creativity.

9. Tagline:

Same as elevator pitch.

10. Look and feel description (including "pacing"):

I want this project to have a very singer-songwriter feel to it...think Colbie Caillat or Jack Johnson vibes (who both happen to be from my hometown, I think). My goal is for it to have an easygoing feel to it, and for my subject to come across as down-to-earth and relatable.

QUESTIONS / NOTES

SUBJECT:

- 1. Why did you choose this location? All of my location ideas (see below) are places where my sister and I have spent considerable time growing up and are aesthetically pleasing locations, to boot.
- 2. Location ideas: Parents' backyard, their living room (where there is a piano), the beach, bike path near my home.

NARRATION/HOST:

- 3. Who will lead us through the piece? My sister, the subject of this piece
- 4. Narration ideas: She'll be answering my questions about her music, but I'll edit it in a way where my voice isn't in it at all.





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
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CREATE A PDF
